The one who had received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. He said, "Master, you gave me five talents. See, I have made five more." His master said to him, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy." Then the one who had received two talents also came forward and said, "Master, you gave me two talents. See, I have made two more." His master said to him, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy." Then the one who had received the one talent came forward and said, "Master, I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not scatter; so out of fear I went off and buried your talent in the ground. Here it is back." His master said to him in reply, "You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I did not plant and gather where I did not scatter? Should you not then have put my money in the bank so that I could have got it back with interest on my return? Now then! Take the talent from him and give it to the one with ten. For to everyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside,

where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."-- Matthew 25:14-30

Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary- Nov. 21st

Our Blessed Mother Mary, the first Saint, gives us the perfect example of what to do with our 'talents' all the love, gifts, and assets God has bestowed upon us; for she gave all, by her complete gift of self for God's mission of salvation for all humankind.

In the Presentation of Mary by her parents to God there is an emphasis on the grateful preparation and cooperation of Mary's parents in salvation history. For there is a tradition that Mary was prepared for her holy mission from birth. The greatest treasure given to Anna and Joachim was Mary and they acknowledged that by offering her to God. This is an example parents should follow today.

Mary's presentation was celebrated in Jerusalem in the sixth century. A church was built there in honor of this mystery. The Eastern Church was more interested in the feast, but it does appear in the West in the 11th century. Although the feast at times disappeared from the calendar, in the 16th century it became a feast of the universal Church.

As with Mary's birth, we read of Mary's presentation in the temple only in apocryphal literature. In what is recognized as an unhistorical account, the *Protoevangelium of James* tells us that Anna and Joachim offered Mary to God in the Temple when she was 3 years old. This was to carry out a promise made to God when Anna was still childless. Though it cannot be proven historically, Mary's presentation has an important theological purpose. It continues the impact of the feasts of the Immaculate Conception and of the birth of Mary. It emphasizes that the holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond.

Reflection

It is sometimes difficult for modern Westerners to appreciate a feast like this. The Eastern Church, however, was quite open to this feast and even insistent about celebrating it. Even though the feast has no basis in history, it stresses an important truth about Mary: From the beginning of her life, she was dedicated to God. She herself became a greater temple than any made by hands. God came to dwell in her in a marvelous manner and sanctified her for her unique role in God's saving work. At the same time, the magnificence of Mary enriches her children. They—we—too are temples of God, made in His image and likeness) and sanctified in order that we might enjoy and share in God's saving work. This is a very sobering fact. Whatever we do to and with our bodies we do to Christ, for our personhood was intended to be holy and dedicated to Him. We are embodied souls that God has endowed with dignity and purpose. We were not meant to bury our gifts but to use them to increase God's kingdom, to share the Good News of Christ, the Living Word.-Franciscan Media
